But for many first-timers, the prospect of buying a new Motorhome or RV can be an overwhelming process. What do you look for? What are the best models? How do you know you're getting the best deal?

- 6. Motorhome and RV shows are an excellent way to help you identify models you like. And taking along a digital camera, or camera phone, allows you to take pictures of the motorhomes you like, or features that impress. You can then use these pictures when you start looking at models to buy.
- 7. There are thousands of experienced motorcaravanners out there who are happy to help people who are new to Motorhome ownership. So ask them for their opinions. There are supposedly two major changes for us Brits travelling in our Motorhomes / RVs to France from this year.

It is hard to prove conclusively that they are now law but it would be sensible to know about them.

- 1. The need to **carry a breathalyser kit** for each person on your Motorhome with you
- 2. If you have **speed camera detection** on your SatNav under POI (points of interest) you will have to disable it.

You can order a twin NF pack of personal breathalysers here from <mark>Alcosense</mark>. Just make sure you get the ones that conform to the supposed new French law.

We are not sure what you do if you cannot disable the POI function on your SatNav but from things we have read that under the new french law they can fine you up to Euros\$1000 and impound your motorhome. This is in line with them 'hiding' speed cameras and ensuring being aware of them is illegal under french law.



**UPDATE:** 8/3/12 Assuming your SatNav is a TomTom when you plug it into TomTom HOME there is an option to exclude POI for France. May be worth selecting this option!

**UPDATE:** 12/8/13 latest views on breathalysers are that this will no longer be enforced by the French but suggest checking the latest website bulletins before travelling, there are definately some grounds for confusion but we would hate you to be caught out. The satnay advice is defibrately current but TomTom etc give you the option when you connect your device

Not only does it feature a Jacuzzi on the roof, but also a 36ft terrace leading to it - lots of room to set up the tables and chairs and a barbecue then!

The 49ft-long, 6.5-ton vehicle has a built-in electrical generator meaning you don't have to stop your partying whilst on the move.

Inside it has a full-sized living room and bed area, as well as a 'kitchenette'. Outside you'll find the reason for the 'sports' moniker, a garage which you can access from the side, or rear, perfect for parking your latest Lamborghini or Ferrari. The Futuria only has a top speed of 55 mph, so if you are in a hurry, you may wish to let down the ramps and let your supercar out to drive to your destination separately.





### Motorhome - Definition, Blog 11

A motorhome is a type of self-propelled recreational vehicle or RV which offers living accommodation combined with a vehicle engine. The term motorhome is most commonly used in the UK, United States, Canada, Australia & NZ. They are used for motorhome-travels.

#### Features

A motorhome comprises sleeping accommodation for between 2 and 8 people. Each sleeping place is called a berth. Each berth is either fixed or converts from another part of the motorhome's interior. A kitchenette area will contain cooking equipment. The type of equipment included differs depending on the motorhome make and model, but generally a kitchenette has an oven, grill, hob and sink. More luxury models may also provide a microwave. A separate washroom will be housed in the motorhome. Each washroom will have a flushing cassette toilet, shower and basin. The cassette toilet sometimes swivels to provide extra room and can be accessed from outside the motorhome for easy emptying. More recent motorhomes will have a separate shower cubicle.

A motorhome will also have a cab area with a driver and passenger seat. These seats often swivel to become part of the living space. A dinette area provides a table and seating space typically used for eating meals. A lounge may also be included, consisting of either a u-shaped sofa located in the rear of the motorhome or a side lounge.

#### Ambiguity with RV and campervan

Motorhomes can be easily confused with American RVs and campervans. Their term Recreational Vehicle also refers to trailers and other types of leisure vehicle which can be towed or driven.

Campervans are typically smaller than motorhomes and are constructed differently. Whilst campervans are focussed with mobility and low cost, motorhomes have more emphasis on comfort. For example, campervans generally lack built-in toilets and showers, or a divide between the living compartment and the cab. Volkswagen Westfalia Campers are typical campervans.

## How do I fit and remove my Milenco Wheelclamp? - Blog 13

Just tried this out and was panicky that it may not come off again after fitting. Luckily it did so thought I'd share my experiences, sorry if its already blindingly obvious to many of you but whilst we are 'experts' in hiring vans this is the 1st we have ever owned so its precious to us.

Slide the Milenco front cover with top strap over the wheel in a horizontal position, avoiding the wheel arch of the vehicle.

- 1. Rotate so that the top strap is over the centre of the wheel.
- 2.Insert the right leg through the right side of the front cover, ensuring the rear leg goes behind the tyre.
- 3.Insert the key and release the lock by rotating the key 90 degrees clockwise
- 4.Insert left leg through the left side of the front cover. (Note: Lower edge of left hand locking plate must insert over right hand locking plate.)
- 5.Lock wheelclamp by rotating the key 90 degrees anti-clockwise, and then remove your key.

To remove your Milenco wheelclamp insert key and turn 90 degrees clockwise, pull out left leg. Turn key 90 degrees anti-clockwise, remove key, pull out right leg.


IMPORTANT: (From inner label) To remove your milenco wheelclamp rotate key then push legs together to release locking pins.

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UPDATE: 2020 experience has told ne it is worth oiling the wind coil about once a year, just to keep it from rusting up and locking, I would hate anyone to have to angle grind the lock off, that would be such hard work

Plus it means you don't have all that cable hanging around your van that fellow travellers can trip over.





With the confusion over whether motorhomers in the south of the country can or can't fill their water tanks using a hosepipe we have successfully petitioned two of the water companies in the affected areas to exempt motorhomes from the hosepipe bans that are coming into force early next month. However, there are still several water companies that have either not yet clarified the situation or are still in consultation. Readers are advised to check with their water supplier after April 5 before filling up using a hosepipe. Meanwhile, it is not all bad news – the former Brownhills site in Preston is now under new ownership, which is great news for motorhomers in the area. And, Ford is starting to let details

of its new – and much anticipated – Transit to come out ahead of its official launch next month.In addition, those of you heading north of the border this summer are in for cheaper ferry tickets after the Scottish government agreed to reducing prices after a successful trial. Read on for more...

Came across this wonderful little gadget. It shows the level of gas in a cylinder. Safe, reusable and accurate. Attaches to bottle using magnetic strip.


We have one and its been so much better than memory or turning on the cooker ring and finding it has 'stopped'.



### Types of Motorhome, Blog 33

There are a bewildering set of types and names associated with Motorhomes / RV. We have trawled the internet and offer these types below. Clearly there will be more so feel free to add to the list via the comments below, thanks in advance for your help!

Motorhome: Always a coachbuilt and never a Campervan.

**Panel van conversions:** These motorhomes are based on a commercial metal-panelled van, sometimes known as Campervans.

**Coachbuilts**: Here, the manufacturer takes a chassis and cab from the commercial vehicle manufacturer, but fits their own (usually fibreglass) body to the rear.

'A' Class: A completely custom motorhome body (including cab) mounted on a chassis supplied by a truck manufacturer. Normally the most expensive motorhomes. A purpose built body with integrated cab provides the maximum spaciousness and usually includes beds which can be left permanently made up such as an over cab 'pull-down' double bed above the front seats.

'C' Class: A custom motorhome body mounted on a conventional chassis and cab supplied by a truck manufacturer, usually with a fixed in place bed or storage area over the cab, although this space can sometimes be to claustrophic for Adults as headroom is limited and may be more suitable for children. Also known as C-Class. The manufacturer uses the chassis & cab of the base vehicle and builds a new body onto the back of it, these make up the largest proportion of motorhomes at present although A Class ownership numbers are rising fast. The part of the body extending over the cab is known as the 'over-cab' or 'luton'. An alternative, called a 'low-profile' has a much smaller over-cab space that is used purely for cabinets & storage purposes

**Campervan**: A smaller motorhome with either a fixed roof (high-top) or an elevating roof (pop-top / high-top). Broken down as follows:- High Top The alternative motorhome, which takes the whole of a kombi base vehicle, kits it out with an assortment of necessary fixtures and fittings and then adds standing room via a high roof.

**Elevating Roof:** The elevating (or raised) roof motorhome also uses the equivalent kombi base vehicle to the "high top" and has a similar layout and equipment. The roof can be raised when on site to allow the use of the available standing room and then lowered for travelling and storage.

**Demountable / Slide-on**: A demountable motorhome shell, usually with wind-up or hydraulically operated legs, installed on a ute, truck, or flat-tray. A dual purpose motorhome, a standard 'pick-up' type vehicle with a specially made body that fits onto the pickup bed. These have the advantage that you can 'demount' the body at a campsite and then use the pickup for day trips etc.

**5th Wheeler**: An extension on the front of the motorhome section extends over the tow vehicle, and usually mounts onto a turntable, or "wheel" - hence the name "5th Wheeler"

**RV (Recreational Vehicles):** These are the huge American equivalents to their European cousins. Usually much larger in almost all dimensions. Some have accompanying popout/slideouts (Hydraulically operated sections of the motorhome that expand) which allow for increasing living space when the vehicle is on site / stopped.

I'm sure they are more! but those are the ones that immediately come to mind.





# Dorset and North Devon trip, Blog 37

NOTTS->CAMBRIDGE->NEW FOREST->DORSET->NORTH DEVON->NOTTS 1000 miles

Apart from our trial run for a couple of days to Clumber Park, Notts (in the rain) this was our 1st holiday in our brand new van. Our lovely Autosleeper Clubman Anniversary (nicknamed 'Gav', sorry can't tell you why but it makes us laugh:))

We stocked up and set off to visit my friend Kev in Linton, Cambs and parked the van at the Caravan Club (CC) site at Cherry Hinton, Cambs. Quite a nice site but with differing levels and a rather sereve one-way system which meant you had to queue up at the gate to be registered and then ferried in one at a time, still very convenient for Linton, which we must say is a lovely traditional English village, give it a visit if you have not been there.

We then set off the next morning after a lovely meal, wine fest and sleep at Kevs for the Centenary CC site in the New Forest, Hants travelling round the outskirts of London, it never stopped raining so we were glad to arrive at the site (one of CC's best) based on an old airstrip. Very modern and well laid out but guess what it never stopped raining. The setting for the site is brill and just out of the gate to see New Forest ponies. We will certainly go back again and maybe spend a little longer there next time.

We travelled from the New Forest to Knoll beach Studland one of our fave beaches in all the world to meet up with Annie's 3rd cousin to 'do some' genealogy. Alas no beach today as a washout but nice coffee and lunch in the café. We then went off to Hayman's Cross, Dorset and stayed at Haycraft CC site for 2 nights. Just opposite Dunshay Manor, originally owned by one of Anne's relie, way back. Rather fortuitously our Thurs / Fri stay there coincided with the Railway & Beer Festival, 5 mins walk from our site, now what more could one ask for, well 'no rain' really is the only answer! Went into Swanage on the steam train and visited the family tree research centre on the pier to finally meet up with the wonderfully helpful David Haysom who runs it.

After leaving Haycraft we spent the day as getting sunny on Studland beach and did our first walk in the sand dunes. Even read our books on the beach. After this we checked into Crossovers CC site near Bovington. Best site in the UK we have been to so far, like being in a Canadian outback forest site, but with eco long drop toilets. Not as bad as they sound (honest!) The Sunday we spent walking and sun bathing and reading, bliss!

Monday morning did some shopping in Tesco's on the outskirts of Dorchester then visited Athelhampton house in the rain. Not NT but privately owned. Interesting history and gardens, never stopped raining alas BUT local uni students shooting a movie there, medieval costumes, swords etc what a hoot.

We then travelled on to almost Sidmouth / Honiton and a rather nice CC site at Putts Corner where we met a German couple on the next pitch who had bought their hired van over for Hannover for 3 weeks in the uK, claiming it was cheaper to hire and pay the ferry costs that hire in the UK, now that worries me. What are our UK companies doing? Our new pals had difficulty in getting the electrics to work, nothing too difficult, it was just the usual CC site electric 1/4 twist to get it to lock in. How many others have suffered form that 1st time – I know I did

We then moved onto visit NT house at Killerton, been there before but love it, especially Tom the bears house. After Killerton it was onto Minnows campsite at Sampford Peverell, Devon. Lovely walk out the back of the site along the Grand Western canal, and such a lovely evening stroll ending up with a pint of Otter ale in the local pub.

We then had a lovely drive across Exmoor via Bridgetown. We both fell in love with Exmoor and are ashamed to say it is the 1st time we have visited but we will definitely be back again. After Exmoor we visted the delightful medieval village of Dunster and the NT castle before moving back into Somerset from North Devon and stayed at the Minehead CC site. A nice 3 levelled site with easy walking into town, we even went to see the outside of Butlitz (hehe), actually I was expecting minehead to be quite tacky and tasteless in a Scarborough sort of way but it was surprisingly nice, in fairness I'm sure Scarborough is now, it's just memories I have from my childhood (Discuss!).

From Minehead we went off to Selworthy up a very interesting narrow road, not ideal for Motorhomes but do-able and visited the NT Holnicote estate (pronounced Hunnicutt), now this is what quaint English thatched villages are all about.

After Selworthy it was the prospect of Porlock hill (1 in 3), I chickened out and we went along the Porlock Manor Estate toll road (£4 for a van) and so glad we did and the views are tremendous. You can stop at the top and look out across Porlock Weir and the coast, yummy and those Exmoor ponies ahhh!

Then onto the lovely UK's little Switzerland at Lynemouth & Lynton. Loved the place. The old funicular railway still runs but seems to be no longer water powered, which was its claim to fame. Nice place, nice Devon pasties. Oh and the Glen Lyn gorge is well worth a view.

We stayed the night at Willingcott CC site (no one there) having been through Coombe Martin and Ilfracoombe, not really our cup of tea I'm afraid, but Woolacoombe we loved. Voted 3rd best beach in the UK and I can see why.

Went to visit NT Arlington Court and the National coach and cab museum, all very interesting especially the convoluted link to Sir Francis Chichester.

Then stayed our last 3 nights at Damage Barton associated CC shared between the Caravan Club and Camping and Caravan Club, nice site, great sea views would thoroughly recommend it.

We had trips out and visited the charming Appledore and had fresh fish and chips whilst overlooking the sea. We gave Clovelly a miss as probably similar and just too packed /steep for the van. We did visit Bridport / Barnstable/Broughton & Westward Ho as well.

Oh and we loved every moment of it. Scotland is such a fabulous place, breath taking views, lochs, castles to die for, interesting history and of course the deep fried mars bar. Sadly I still haven't had the chance yet to sample this delicacy but scotch pies, white pud etc etc were yummy!

Remember a picture paints a thousand words!

Basically keeping to the coast we travelled up the east, across top and then back down the west. As we have been to most of the islands already and the cost of taking the van over was not included in our budget we just had our memories and the views from the mainland. Maybe they are for another trip depending upon how much CalMac have ramped up the price for the multi-island passes, must check when I've finished this blog!

So we left home and spent the night with our lovely friends Chris and Allyson in Alnwick, what a great Madar Jaffrey curry, thanks Chris. Part of this trip is inspired by a trip Chris & I did over 40 years ago when we were about 18 and we both hiked & hitched around Scotland, not been back to some of these places since and part so that Annie can get to John O'Groats as well as Landsend, I kept telling her she hadn't missed anything and that proved to be true \*smile\*. Plus thanks to George & Emma for allowing us to park in Green Batt, George suggested his Auto Sleeper Executive and ours may well breed if they got a little closer. Haha – maybe an Eriba. Anyhow after a bit of shopping in Alnwick we set off for the borders.

Then over the impressive Forth Road Bridge and into Fife. Did you know that Dunfermline (home of Annie's ancestors) was once the capital of Scotland. We stopped at the Royal Burgh of Culross to visit the palace there, but sadly it was closed (something to do with a wedding and a corporate 'do' for the National Trust of Scotland). This didn't stop us though and we still looked around the outside, gardens and interesting cobbled back streets. A real nice place. Give it a whirl sometime. No probs with parking the van either, 2 very big car parks that were hardly full. We discover Scotland has a lot of Royal Burgh's an award which seems to have been bestowed the moment a Scottish King or Queen visited but I could be wrong!

Then we drove onto St Andrews for the night, the home of golf, it hardly ever stopped raining. The site was a little expensive at £24 a night but they justified it by having a new indoor heated swimming pool and bar / games room. We went over for a swim but sadly it was a woman only eve, felt a bit conned. Still had a nice evening meal and some wine instead!

Next day we visited Falkland and Falkland Palace, a very impressive castle. The Scots sure know how to do castles. It is also the home of real tennis, the very knowledgeable guide told us there had been a world championship there recently with the team from Ballarat, Vic, Aus represented. Blimey, we have been to Ballarat and it is the most unlikely setting for real tennis. \*surprise\*. It is still effectively owned by the Queen jointly with the NTS (Nat Trust for Scotland) and previously the kings of Scotland.

We then left Fife and travelled into Angus staying at a lovely campsite in Carnoustie, you will need your satnay, it isn't straight forward but Annie thought facilities wise it was the best we stayed in throughout Scotland, and it isn't a Caravan club site.

Having left there we went on through Arbroath & Montrose and visited a bird sanctuary /nature reserve in river basin with great views of Montrose. Never been in this area before but really nice, we would go back again. Whilst in the area we visited the famous House of Dun (NTS), it was owned by Lady Augusta FitzClarence, the illegitimate daughter of William IV (Queen Victoria's dad) and his 'actress' mistress Mrs Johnson with whom he had 10 kids, she had over 20 in total with about 8 different partners, scandal, love it.... She never married any of them but apparently was great on the stage (or was that bed). The other things we remember were the last working damask linen handloom, big sequoias in the garden, the house had many doors that don't open, they were just for symmetrical structure, each side was a mirror image of the other throughout, and joy of joy it had the best 1960's stereo system I have ever seen, I want one. Mick Jagger bought the 1st apparently.

It was then on into Aberdeenshire and Stonehaven which has a heated art deco pool plus we visited Dunnotair castle, are you getting it yet? castles and deep fried Mars bars with the odd Belhaven 80/- beer thrown in and a few lovely single malts and wine. Our ideal hols, hic! We avoided the city of Aberdeen as we had been there before when we went to the Shetland Isles.

The onto the Feughside caravan park in Strachan Banchory Deeside, nice views, mostly a static caravan site though and a very nice pub / restaurant on the riverside less than 2 mins from the van. On this occasion we didn't eat there however as we had fresh food to use but it looked lovely and many of the other 'vanners' were going there. Strachan pronounced "strawn" must be the origins of its sister town in Tasmania, Oz. The river Dee is lovely and looked like a heavily used fly- fishing area, trout apparently.

Got up early the next day as much to see and big distances to travel. Visted Crathes castle & gardens nr Banchory and the craft village. There were many germans, dutch, french, italians with motorbikes, caravans & motorhomes and this repeated itself throughout our 2+ weeks in Scotland especially in the highlands, great to see! Crathes castle gardens had a floral tribute to the Queens 60th jubilee.

By the time we had finished at Crathes it was getting on so I rang the Culloden Moor Caravan Club (CC) site to warn them we would be late. As long as you let them know you can arrive anytime up to 8pm in the eye.

Then it was onto Cruden bay, fish & chips and Viking ships. Lovely quiet harbour and a beach to die for. Highly recommended! Then onto buller o'buchan just down the road. Similar to Pancake Rocks blow holes in NZ but not so dramatic and only one, maybe Scotland's answer to Durdle Door in Dorset but with a wave pool. We did go thru / stop at Peterhead & Fraserburgh but not much to recommend them unless you are into industry and oil, sorry!

Then turned the coastal corner into Banffshire – Macduff, don't mention the Scottish play – did WillS really travel this far?,Banff with its own version of the Banff Springs hotel (haha – not surprisingly missing out slightly in the class / cost stakes, Then Morayshire including Portsoy,Cullen where Cullen skink comes from (a haddock soup) and thru Nairn onto Invernesshire for the 1st time this holiday.

We stayed at Culloden Moor CC site for 2 days, nice setting and facilities, but v busy. From here we were able to visit Culloden Battlefield, one of the best historical presentations we have ever seen anywhere in the world and great use of technology to deliver the story. Well done them, do visit you will learn loads, we did. All about bonnie prince charlie, duke of Cumberland and what a disaster the dukes 25th b'day party was for the Jacobite clansmen. There long march and hoped for surprise (haha) just didn't work and after 1 hour they had lost many many body. Interesting Charlie saw the writing on the wall and ran off after 10 mins (over the sea to Skye and never ever to return). The battle field is rather poignantly a war grave. In the afternoon we went in search of the Thane of Cawdor (oh no not the Scottish play again) by going to Cawdor castle, just down the road from the campsite, so all in all a great choice of site for the closeness of stuff to see nearby.

The next day we called into Inverness to get fuel etc but didn't stay long as we have been there a few times in the past. Then it was up the A9, across the Cromarty bridge and into Rosshire, Alness (nice) and Invergordon (not so nice, oil platform restorations) there was a German cruise ship in presumably so they could visit Culloden etc, surely not Invergordon itself? Then onto Tain (brill) where there was diamond jubilee celebrations for the bank hol including Capercaille playing for free, alas we couldn't stay on as they weren't playing until late in the evening but they are great and were on previously in Culross for £25. Had my 1st warmed scotch pie here \*hungry\*

Then a visit to the Glenmorangie distillery where I bought a glass. Annie stayed in the van as she said no interest in whiskey. I bought 2 bottles of single malt whilst away, Old Pultenay & The Dalwhine, nice flavour both.

Then it was onto Sutherland and many town / villages / hamlets the best of which was possibly Dornoch, nice old town and great architecture plus a good beach with the East Sutherland lifeboat station. There are also some nice lovely old towns at golspie,brora & helmsdale.

Then we were into Caithness where we stayed at the Wick riverside site, quiet and cheap if somewhat antiquated facilities. The couple running it were very helpful. The SatNav guides you to the entrance under a railway bridge,

watch out it is very low, We rang them and the guy came out and guided us round through the other entrance. Enjoyed our stay at the site. Found out that Caithness glass closed sadly 2006, became dartington crystal then closed in perth, may now be in crieff? Shame some great glass pieces were produced by them, real works of art! After visiting the Old Pultenay distillery in Wick (2012 whiskey of the year) and the old harbour and heritage area we set off for John o groats. There had been a fire on the heather moors the previous day that had shut the A99 but today it was open but the smoke, fire and smell still raged filling the van with an acrid stench that was fun to get rid of.

We got great views of the Orkney & Stroma and did the usual tourist stuff but the craft area is not as active / busy as Landsend. We also visited Duncansby head and The Queen mums castle of Mey (v interesting) and stayed at Dunnet bay (view of dunnet head) caravan club site which has a great beach which we went for a walk on, we had it to ourselves and oh so sunny, best weather in the country.

The next day onto Thurso & rain & shopping then to scrabster to revisit the ferry we used in 1987-ish for our holiday to the Orkneys when the boys were v young. Then on back into Sutherland again. Thru Coldbackie, Tongue & the youth hostel (Chris do you remember this, chores using a toothbrush before we could go to catch the one bus that left every 2nd Tuesday, Royal Mail with veg and livestock?) then round loch eriboll (wow – the best) single track with passing places and very busy then onto Sango sands campsite at Durness where we stayed for 2 days. It was windy, remote but brill views, loved it! On the 2nd day we drove down to the Durness quayside about 2 miles from site and went on a truly memorable trip to the great cape wrath (see pix – loved it) and came back to the craft village at balnakeil and visited its beach/ house/ cathedral ruins.... Walk to faraid head is rated as a must but we didn't have time to do it so walked some of the beach, you need to be careful as families have been cut off here by the returning tide which circles round the back of the sand. Our Cape Wrath guide warned us of this.

Then it was the roads to Ullapool, into Rosshire again and first Armaid and then to our Broomfield caravan park site next to Broom loch, conveniently places minutes from town and ferry terminal at Ullapool. Indeed the ferry runs past the campsite which I remember from when we went on it early 90s to Lewis & Harris. Would you believe it we couldn't get a high tea in Ullapool although there appears to be a good Indian restaurant next to the campsite now!

The next day it was the Wester ross coastline a real highlight including the Corrieshalloch gorge & suspension bridge, a lovely valley, little Gruinard beach, loch ewe (home of war time exercises),loch torridon, the brilliant Inverewe gardens nts, some of the best in Scotland based on location and plantsmanship. Then loch maree, the wonderful road to shieldaig, gairloch, loch carron and then into Skye & lochalsh.

Here we saw a weird heather burn possibly that joined the smoke to the clouds, before reaching the famous road to the isles, which we have travelled many a time. Love it. We alighted at Dornie to see the most photographed Eilean doran castle, indeed Annie's Canadian cousin Janet had this as her Facebook background pic. We stayed at Morvich CC site, very nice, for 1 night, superb beinn / mountains on all 4 sides.

We left the next day to return to Fort Augustus (too touristy for us) and the wonderful Loch ness although not surprisingly Nessie was not "out to play" that day!

From here it was to Fort William where the world Mountain bike champs were on that weekend at Beinn Nevis so very busy and wet \*sigh\*. We booked into Brumlee CC site at South Onich nearby for 2 nights overlooking Loch Linnhe. Great site great views great midges, don't forget the spray folks!

We were planning to go up Beinn Nevis on the Monday by cable car as never having been up there but sadly we had a big leak in the van overnight which mean the duvet acted as a wick and woke up wet. So rang the van people who asked us to bring it back. So sadly but sensibly we left early. Wouldn't have been good if it had happened in Europe. We want it fixed before our next trips!

So it was 400 miles back thru Argyll & Bute, loch leven, the truly wonderful glencoe, crianlarich, loch Lomond, trossachs, bypass Glasgow, Carlisle, M6 home... 6.5 hrs tired but ready to get the van into workshop the next day.

UPDATE 15/6 they have found a seal leak around one of the windows so hopefully it will now be fixed. Currently undertaking serious soak test and leaving it out in heavy rain.



As we were offered 2 free weeks holiday by Don Amotts (apart from paying for electric hook-up and entertainments) when we bought our motorhome from them who are we to refuse? So we decided to take the 1st week at their Lakeside Park Holiday park in North Somercotes. 

# Winterisation tips - Part 1 - Blog

51

By keef & annie, Nov 5 2012 01:59PM Winterisation (is that a word really?!)

Motorhome put to bed now for 2012 especially as the ice is drawing in.

There are some pictures of the van all packed up and covered for WINTER 2012 available under the site photos and slideshow tabs. In order to see these it is necessary to login using either your Facebook login / password or set

yourself up one for our site, which will mean supplying your email address and accepting the automatic link that is sent to your inbox. EASY

Luckily after our last trip away we happened to find a mega car wash on the Ashbourne road just outside Derby which had the facilities, staff and equipment to wash the motorhome. Only £15, a good deal for over 30mins of work. It looked immaculate! Plus it brought up shine again after the yacht waxing I'd spent all those hours doing during the year on the monocoche shell and the cabin waxing.

After we had driven it home, we took all the bedding, food cans etc etc out and stored them inside the house, well actually the food will obviously be well and truly eaten by next season.

I open all water taps up fully, inside and out, including the hot water pump inside to drain out ALL (hopefully) the water. LEAVE THEM OPEN ALL WINTER. I then took off all taps inside. Be careful so as not to damage the threading. I then used the pump to blow out any remaining water in the pipe work and it was surprising how much there is even though the outside taps had stopped draining.

We also made sure that the fridge was off and cleaned out, including any ice remnants in the freezer box. Put the plug in the sink to stop bad smells (if any). Connected up the electrics with an RCD / timer and wire cover into the garage and the engine switch on to allow a weekly charge just to ensure the engine battery doesn't flatten over Winter, and probably more importantly turn off the Cat 1 alarm system.

I also put all manner of security locks on, 2 on the tyres, one on the steering column etc etc. We will shift it a few times over the Winterisation period just to ensure the rubber on the tyres doesn't sit in the same position for too many weeks / months.

Finally we put the breathable cover completely over the van. Note this is not an easy task even for 2 with ladders, and brooms. Suggestion: Maybe get a few friends around to help.

Anyway that's it. It is our first winter with the van so we will no doubt learn and let you know what we discover good and / or bad.

Anyone else care to share what they have done to winterise their van or plan to do if anything. Is it a good idea or a waste of time? Have your say here in the comments under this blog. Let's get a discussion going.





There is also the consolidation of **26 original photosnack slideshows** s creating 3 30 minute long slideshows which show our adventures plus one additional one showing every campsite we stayed at, most of which were via the ACSI book, if you are travelling France then it is a must. For UK folk get membership from Vicarious books in Kent http://www.vicariousbooks.co.uk/ or direct from ACSI online .There is also a book of all the Aires which are similar to the UKs CLs/ CSs (certified location/site) where for a fraction of the price and limited services you can stay overnight (or longer) on your journey. Tip take your own loo seat, paper, soap and towel in France, most sites do not provide these. Also the reverse polarity issue is not as bad as some would have you believe, after checking the 1st 5 sites with my expensive kit I gave up, it is I believe only an issue if your internal electrical items are faulty. Don't forget your 2 pin convertor – many of the sites are not bayonet fittings oh and most are 6 amp, 10 is becoming more the norm but they will charge you for an upgrade if their system allows it so take that gas kettle else you will blow the fuse!

Most sites have great swimming pools often indoor as well as outdoor so that is a real plus.

- 2. Volonne (Provence) to Finistere (Bretagne/Brittany)
- 3. <u>Clohars-Carnoet (Bretagne) to Home</u>

# Blog 74 - How to fit a Rear View Camera to your Motorhome

By keef and annie hellinger, Sep 19 2014 05:50PM

This guide shows you how to fit one to a specific motorhome but in our humble opinion the principle is the same which ever home you fit it to.

Summary of steps
1. It's a sensible precaution to test that the components are all functioning correctly before starting to install them. A fully charged 12V battery or suitable power supply will be required. Gentle flexing of the cable and joints should ensure that there are no breaks or snags.
2. Mark out the position of the camera bracket in the centre of reverse slope under the high-mounted stop lamp. Auto-Sleepers fit a horizontal metal reinforcement behind the inner skin of the Styrofoam panel and the hole should be above this. On this vehicle the reinforcement ended 40mm above the cupboard base, but this should be confirmed with a stud detector. Inside the rear cupboard, drill a 30mm diameter access hole through the inner insulation just above the camera bracket location.
3. Drill two 6mm diameter holes for the screw fixings, coat the camera bracket with mastic and temporarily secure with 6mm screws and nuts. Use large washers on the inner surface of the GRP panel. Use a $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch M10 socket and universal drive to hold the nut. Tape the socket and any extension together to avoid dropping into the void. When the mastic has set, remove screws, coat the holes and washers with additional mastic and reassemble. This process gives a better seal because it allows the bracket to be secured before the mastic has set and then holds it while it sets.
4. Drill two 8mm diameter cable holes below the bracket. Fit the sleeve grommets to the cables, coat the holes and grommets with mastic and feed through the GRP panel and inner insulation. Wipe off excess mastic and arrange a loop in the cables to shed water. It may be easier to fit the sleeve grommets if they are split lengthwise and rejoined with superglue.
5. Remove left-side rear light and locate the harness feed hole. Drill a 19mm hole in left side of rear cupboard wall at level of 30mm hole.
6. Locate the left-rear light harness under the rear floor, remove the mastic from the feed hole through the floor and ensure that the hole is large enough to pass the cable plugs.?To avoid damaging the lighting harness it may be more convenient to cut it and pull it through the rear lamp feed hole. It can be rejoined later.
7. Moving to the front of the vehicle, remove the left fusebox cover and glovebox. To do this you need to remove the pocket above the fusebox to reveal a hidden fixing for the glovebox panel.
8. Inside the cab, remove the passenger wheelarch and side step trims and locate the large harness entry hole giving?access to the left side-member.
9. Feed the cable horizontally across the rear wall void from the 30mm hole to the 19mm hole made in step 5. Then vertically down to the rear light cable hole, through the floor, under the floor following the route of the rear light harness to the large grommet in the rear outer of the left side-member. Go along the interior of the left side-member, out the step harness entry hole, up the left wheelarch and into left fusebox area securing with tie wraps
10. The rear light hole and the 19mm hole are used as access holes and the cable is only temporarily looped through them. Electrician's cable feed rods are strongly recommended for this process, though stiff wire may make a suitable alternative. Secure the cable to the access hole plugs with cable ties, feed the cable into the void and fit the plugs. These are purely precautionary measures in case cable recovery is required in the future.

- 11. Attach the mirror monitor to the existing mirror and route its cable tail to the left fusebox area via the headlining and left A-pillar trim. Secure the monitor control box to a blank area of the fusebox. Locate suitable feeds for the cameras and monitor.
- 12. Auto-Sleepers taps into the cigarette lighter feed from the fusebox for the rear step warning buzzer and this makes a suitable ignition-controlled source for the permanent camera. Connect with an inline fuse of 3-5A. A multiterminal plug for the left rear light harness is located at the base of the A-pillar and the lead to the reversing light can be identified by cable colours and confirmed using a voltmeter. Connect the monitor AV2 switch wire to this lead. Fit the earth return to a suitable point. Connect all leads and loop any excess cable neatly in the left fusebox area.
- 13. Reconnect the rear light harness, if cut, and seal in a weatherproof junction box if external. Fill the floor access hole with a suitable non-setting mastic.
- 14. Tape the cable to the rear light harness and refit the rear light unit. Test that the system operates satisfactorily and adjust the camera angles using the adjustable brackets on the sides. When happy with the view, bolt the unit to its final position.

Pete & Joy arrived about 6pm-ish. We had some nice ale and wine to get the weekend started


Had a lovely lasagne and salad that joy cooked , then pud and cheese, bikkies and wine. Lots of happy talking and then to bed.

Loved the cottage, beautiful views, fruit bushes, cockerel and chickens to feed (naan bread a particular favourite),


Will definitely bring the campervan back to this area, spied a good one near Bampton and if we could stand it the site outside the Shadingfield Fox although it looked mega – naff!

You can get away with ACSI, UK Caravan Club & UK Camping & Caravan club if you are lucky in one or 2 sites but that won't last for long and give you unneccesary hassle on what should be a relaxing holiday.

Despite ACSI's notes that you MAY need one, you definately WILL need one. Remember ACSI is a Dutch company and their card is not used readable on most scandi campsite computers to automatically get your details off.

No need to buy one upfront you can get one at the  $1 \mathrm{st}$  scandi site you stay at costing about £14 (2016).

What you will need for cheaper camping in the scandinavian countries is

DENMARK - CC Europe card, ACSI Discount card, Pay on leaving (i.e they keep your cards as security

SWEDEN - CC Europe card, ACSI Discount card, Pay up front

FINLAND - CC Europe card, ACSI Discount card, Pay up front

NORWAY - CC Europe card, ACSI Discount card, Pay up from

Note in Germany , France and Holland the ACSI members card and discount card are fine and there is a mixture of paying up front and on departure.



Anyhow travelled to the lovely Cofton Country Holiday Park (ACSI site) near Dawlish in Devon where we stayed for 4 nights. We called in on Dawlish before making camp and had a good look around. This is the coast where the railway was washed away by sweeping seas not that long ago and is a traditional seaside town, slightly run down but we liked it.

At Cofton there is lots to do and lovely large grassy pitches, only a few hard standing. Met nice couple from Leicestershire of all places. One outdoor and one indoor pool, indeed on the last day we had it to ourselves for most of the time, plus games rooms, keep fit (you are joking?), bars ,cafes and restaurants.

On our second day there we caught the Stagecoach bus just up the road to Starcross and took the ferry over to

The next day we did the short country walk from Cofton to Cockwood passing very interesting wild flowers, nature gardens and loved seeing the wild pink orchids. It was a lovely sunny day and you come our at the boat moorings inlet of the river Exe. We did our own version of a pub crawl visiting both pubs in Cockwood. The Anchor (an old smugglers inn) did the better beer but the Ship had the best gardens and flowers.







A very nice Camping and Caravan site at Greetham with reductions for Caravan Club members but no reduction for ACSI members as only ACSI approved not registered. Your Caravan club card is kept during your stay as the deposit for the site security card which you need for all barriers and gates during your stay.

The site has a mixture of both hard standing and grass pitches and there are 2 areas one for adults only and one for families. There are two toilet blocks, the one on the adults only area is much more modern with great under floor heating and wet room showers.

There are dog walks at both ends of the site, an indoor swimming pool , hot tub and limited games room plus a kids play park in the middle of the family area. It is a very large site with about 130 pitches and tenting areas in the middle of the family area. Fees apply for the pool and hot tub; see their website for more details <u>HERE</u>.

We were on pitch 21 in the adult only area. All pitches have all 3 services i.e electrics, drinking water and drain for your grey waste assuming you have the right length of pipe work.

Right next to our pitch was the walkway thru the woods to the perimeter gate which led 2 ways into the village either via church lane or the community centre. Its only about 15 mins leisurely stroll into the village and the autumn colours were beautiful. St Mary's church is a delight and it is such a lovely village with supposedly 3 pubs, we only found one, the Plough, which has great real ales, friendly staff and a gut busting dinner for a reasonable price which we had a lunch time on our second day. The chef even gave me a few tips on veggie cooking

We had a bit of a mosey around after lunch before returning for an afternoon of luxury reading, such a treat! On leaving we went via the south side of Rutland water and visited the village of Manton with its wonderful priory and St Mary's church. We had not been there before and down a public bridleway there were great view of Rutland water.

We liked Greetham a lot and will hopefully return again, it's a great starting point for discovering Rutland. If you would like to see the slideshows click <u>HERE</u> thanks.


We had a fun time despite being ill for quite a while and loved our Atul Kutcher meal on the 25th in the Benares offshoot on board called Sindhu.

#### Monday 5 February - Southampton

Monday 5 February - Southampton

After a busy turnaround, which saw all new passengers embark, with baggage and enough stores for the duration of the cruise. Ventura was ready to sail. Prior to departure from any port, the Captain receives positive reports from key personnel in every department to indicate that the ship is fit for the intended voyage. This would include confirmation of propulsion and susiliary machinery readiness and that fuel, fresh water, jube oil and spares are safely stowed for the intended passage. Additionally, that the ship's stability criteria as per the International Maritime Organisation requirement has been met. That all Life saving appliances are ready for immediate use and all navigational Systems are fully operational. That all guests, crew as well as a local pillot are on board and clearance to sail has been granted by the local immigration authorities. Thus, with physical confirmation that the ships side openings were secured for sea as the final positive report. Ventura commenced the voyage. The Master manoeuvred Ventura off the berth at Ocean Terminal and slowly moved ahead. Officers, who are always stationed forward and aft for every arrival and departure, reported clearances, aiding the turn into the buoyed channel of the Solent. Ventura slowed to pass the Fawley Oil Terminal to starboard, followed by a slight heel to port, and then to starboard of sea successfully managed the hairpin bends of Calshot Spit and Bramble Bank to sail on to pass Cowes on the lise of Wight. Having Portsmouth abalt the beam, Ventura selection after disembarking the pilot. Westerly Courses set, Ventura headed into the English Channel, towards the North Atlantic.

Weather: Partly Cloudy Wind: North-easterly, Force 3 (10 knots) Temperature: 5°C/41.0°F

#### Tuesday 6 February - At Sea

Just as the sun rose, Ventura past Casquets amidst moderate marine traffic. As the day drew on, Ventura's bridge team navigated towards Lizard Point and the mouth of the English Channel. By midday, Ventura crossed the 5° West line and committed to a great circle sail across the North Atlantic towards the Azores.

Noon Position: 48° 57.6' N 006° 20.8' W Distance till Noon: 260 NM Weather: Overcast with Occasional Showers Wind: Northerly, Force 8 (35 knots) Temperature: 6°C/42.8°f

#### Wednesday 7 February - At Sea

Early moming, in the tiny hours, Ventura sailed out of and away from European waters. Ventura continued committed to her sail along the arc of the great circle track towards the Azores with, turbulent seas predominating her way. By late afternoon, the sea conditions calmed as Ventura sailed on towards crepuscular horizons.

Noon Position: 45° 04.6' N 014° 13.6' W Noon to Noon: 398 NM Weather: Overcast with Occasional Showers Wind: Northerly, Force 8 (38 knots) Temperature: 11°C/51.8°F

#### Thursday 8 February - At Sea

No change of course had occurred for some 85NM as Ventura continued south-westerly along the arc of the great circle track towards the Azores, By midday Ventura was some 730 NM to the north west of the Portuguese capital of Lisbon and sailing across the Macico Dos Azores Biscay.

Noon Position: 40° 39.2' N 021° 07.8' W Noon to Noon: 405 NM Weather: Mostly Cloudy Wind: West-north-westerly, Force 5 (20 knots) Temperature: 15°C/57°F

#### Friday 9 February - Ponta Delgada

Friday 9 February - Ponta Delgada
East of Sao Miguel Ventura completed her great
circle route and continued on rhumb line tracks
as the approaches to Ponta Delgada neared. With
pilot on board, Ventura sailed past the breakwaters
and turning to Starboard about 180°, as the
winds remained northerly. All the preparations
were completed after reversing into position port
side alongside. Once clearance was granted by
immigration, all were free to proceed ashore in
Ponta Delgada. From departure Southampton to
arrival Ponta Delgada. Ventura steamed a distance of
1324 Nautical miles. Ponta Delgada, on São Miguel
Island, is the capital of the Azores archipelago of
Portugal. The striking, 3-arched city gates ain
the Gothic-style Church of St. Sebastian are near
the harbour. The Convent and Chapel of Our Lady
of Hope houses a revered image of Christ. The
Carlos Machado Museum offers diverse artefacts of
Azorean culture. The city is a gateway to the crater
lakes of Sete Cidades, to the northwest.

Weather: Partly Odudy Wind: West-north-westerly, Force 4 (15 knots) Temperature: 20°C/68°F

All souls were on board and clearance granted when the gangways were shipped and the Manoeuvre commenced. Thrusting off the berth Ventura turned to Starboard, then proceeded past the breakwaters and out of the harbour. With pilot away, Ventura continued south-westerly courses.

#### Saturday 10 February - At Sea

Ventura made her way southwestward out of Azorean Territorial waters and committed to a great circle track across the Atlanto towards Barbados. Crossing over the fabled Atlants Sea Mount before midday, Ventura remained within the range of the permanent high-pressure region, for which the Azores is renown, throughout the day.

Noon Position: 35° 02.1' N 031° 09.8' W Distance till Noon: 313 NM Weather: Sparse Cloud Wind: Northerly, Force 5 (18 knots) Temperature: 18°C/64.4°F

#### Sunday 11 February - At Sea

Overnight Ventura sailed towards the trade wind belt as she continued along the arc of the great circle track to Barbados. Sea and winds started to increase by midday while Ventura commenced crossing the 370 NM wide Mid Atlantic Ridge where the half way mark lay.

Noon Position: 30° 59.4 N 038° 05.8 W Noon to Noon: 428 NM Weather: Overcast Wind: North-easterly, Force 6 (25 knots) Temperature: 20°C/68°F

#### Monday 12 February - At Sea

Monday 12 February - Ar Sea Ventura continued along the arc of the great circle track sailing across the Atlantic towards the Barbados. By mid morning, Ventura past the half way mark, however it was not until late evening that Ventura cleared the 5800 odd meter Ridge, which lay diagonally across her path. The Mid-Atlantic Ridge is very close to the height of Mount Kilimanjaro at several points

#### Tuesday 13 February - At Sea

nuesday 15 February - At Sea A quiet night and beautiful moming as the sun rose astern, with Ventura south of 23.4° N latitude thus officially in the Tropics. Altering course by one degree every 112 NM Ventura maintained the arc of the great circle track through the Atlantic towards Barbados. With the Mid Atlantic ridge cleared, Ventura begun to feel the adverse effects of the North Equatorial Current which, follows the island chain northward, all the way from as far south as Suriname to the coast of Florida.

#### Wednesday 14 February - At Sea

Into the morning, Ventura continued southwesterly, along the arc of the great circle track towards Barbados. Through the Demarara Abyssal Plain, Flying fish skipped across the ocean's surface propelled by Ventura's wake. By late evening, the Lights of Barbados Shoe on the horizon as Ventura made landfall,

#### Thursday 15 February - Bridgetown

Thursday 15 February - Bridgetown
The morning was quite busy for the bridge team
as they guided Ventura to the end of her great
circle passage and unto Rhumb line tracks to round
the north coast of Barbados. Once on a southerly
course, Ventura made progress to the approaches
to Bridgetown. The pilot boarded and Ventura
slowly made way past the breakwaters and into the
harbour. Steady enterprise saw Ventura make fast
amidst high winds. Starboard side to quay and with
clearance granted and gangways at the ready, all
were free to proceed ashore. From departure Ponta
Delgada to arrival Bridgetown, Ventura steamed
a distance of 2345 Natitical miles. Barbados is an
eastern Caribbean island and an independent British
Commonwealth nation. Bridgetown, the capital, is

a cruise-ship port with colonial buildings and Nidhe Israel, a synagogue founded in 1654. Around the Island are beaches, botanical garders, the Harrison's Cave formation, and 17th-century plantation houses like St. Nicholas Abbey, Local traditions include afternoon tea and cricket, the national sport.

Weather: Partly Cloudy with Occasional Showers Wind: North-easterly, Force 5 (19 knots) Temperature: 29°C/84.6°F

All Souls on board and clearance granted was the indication to secure the gangways and let go lines. Thrusted off the berth, with stern way Ventura slowly manoeuvred into the basin. The midships had just cleared the breakwaters when Ventura began to swing, stern first, to exit the basin. Ventura's 90° turn was desterously completed and with engines set to half-ahead, salled through breakwaters. Not long after, Ventura' was full away on sea passage with courses set for the next port of call Pointe a Pitre.

#### Friday 16 February - Pointe a Pitre

Friday 16 February - Pointe a Pitre
Throughout the night, Ventura progressed
northerly on the Caribbean Atlantic front, sailing
past Martinique and Dominica to port. It was still
twilight, when the pilot boarded and guided Ventura
through the narrow perplexities of the channels
meander. Into the turning basin and unto the berth,
Ventura was in position Starboard side to quay,
with lines all fast. From departure Bridgetown to
arrival Pointe a Pitre, Ventura steamed a distance of
211 Nautical miles. Guadeloupe, a French overseas
region, is an island group in the southern Caribbean
Sea. Resembling a butterfly, its 2 largest islands
are separated by the Salée River. Hilly Grande-Ierre
Island has long beaches and sugarcine fields. On
Basse-Terre Island, Parc, National de la Guadeloupe
encompasses Carbet Falls and the volcano La Grande
Soutrière. Smaller Islands include Marie-Galante and
La Déstrade.

Weather: Partly Cloudy Wind: Light Air (3 knots) Temperature: 28°C/82.4°F

It was confirmed that all souls were on board and clearance granted when the gangways were shipped and the Manoeuwe commenced. Thrusting off the berth with sternway, Ventura entered the basin and with precise adroitness, the master with the aid of the bridge team spun Ventura 180° and proceeded through the convoluted narrows out into open sea. With pilot away Ventura continued on southerly courses between the isles Mane Galante and Grande Inlet as she navigated to her next port of call St. John's.

#### Saturday 17 February - St. John's

Saturday 17 February - St. John's

Weaved between islands courses lead northerly,
leaving Guadeloupe to the right and rounding
Montserrat to the left as Ventura past the southern
tip of Antigua. The morning dew was visible on the
lush flora, as the pilot boat left the shore side and
approached Ventura. Tentatively, Ventura under
pilotage salled down the exceedingly narrow channel
often referred to as the 'laws of Death', into the
harbour where, the master dexterously apposition
Sarboard side to quay. With gangways at the ready,
and clearance granted by the immigration, all were
free to proceed ashore in St. Johns. From departure
Pointe a Pitre to arrival St. John's, Ventura steamed
a distance of 142 Nautical miles. Antiqua is one of
the two major islands that make up the Caribbean
nation of Antiqua and Barbuda. Ringed with coral
reefs, it is known for its many sandy beaches
superlative boating, exemplary food, family-friendly
activities, and legendary cocktails. Set along English
Harbour, restored Nelson's Dockyard, which Admiral
Horatio Nelson made his base in the 1780s, includes
a marine and the Dockyard Museum. Trails lead
up to Shirley Heights, a former military lookout with
pancramic views.

Weather: Sunny.

Weather: Sunny, Wind: East-north-easterly, Force 5 (21 knots) Temperature: High 25°C /77°F

All Souls on board and clearance granted was the indication to secure the gangways and let go lines. Thrusting off the berth, with stem way Ventura slowly manoeuvred into the basin and with cool intellect, the master soun Ventura 180° before sailing back the way she came, through West Channel and out of the harbour. Ventura continued north easterly to clear the Coral reefs before adopting westerly courses to the next port of call Ocho Rios.

#### Sunday 18 February - At Sea

Throughout night and into the morning Ventura continued sailing through the Caribbean Sea westerly, and past south of the British Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico, which remained visible until mid morning. By midday, Ventura had the mainland Hispaniola to the north off the Starboard beam for the remainder of the day. Late evening, saw Ventura

sail between Haiti and the north coast of Jamaica with lights of the distant Cuba faintly visible on the

#### Monday 19 February - Ocho Rios

Monday 19 February - Ocho Rios

Altering course to round the isles, Ventura continued into the night on westerly courses along the Jamaican north coast. Turquoise waters were clearly present with sunrise abart of Ventura, as she maintained a westerly course to the approaches to Ocho Rios. At noon with pilot onboard, Ventura adopted a southerly approach and with a graceful manoeuvre port, she was alongside Starboard side to quay. With gangways at the ready, and clearance granted by immigration, all were free to proceed ashore in Ocho Rios. From departure St. John's to arrival Ocho Rios, Ventura steamed a distance of 884 Nautical miles. Jamaica, a Caribbean island nation, has a lush topography of mountains, rainforests and reef-lined beaches. Many of its all-inclusive resorts are clustered in Montego Bay, with its British-colonial architecture, and Negril, known for its diving and snorkeling sites, Jamaica, famed as the birtiplace of reggae music, and its capital Kingston is home to the Bob Marley Museum, dedicated to the famous singer. Ocho Rios is a former fishing village adjacent to the parish of Saint Ann, which is home to rainforest, rivers and waterfalls. Dunn's River Falis is a terraced. 180m mountain waterfall with lagoon pools, surrounded by trees.

Weather: Sunny

Weather: Sunny Wind: Easterly, Force 5 (21 knots) Temperature: 26°C/78.8°F

All souls were on board and clearance granted when the gangways were shipped and the Manoeuvre commenced. Thrusting off the berth with no headway ventura turned to port 180° before sailing back the way she came, out of the harbour. Northerly to clear the mainland Ventura made way into open sea, before altering westerly to her next port of call Montego Bay.

#### Tuesday 20 February - Montego Bay

Tuesday 20 February - Montego Bay
Throughout the night, Ventura continued westward
towards Montego Bay and once within 12 NM, the
bridge team began preparations for the arrival, With
all checks completed and pilot on board Ventura
made her way into the basin. The master's prowess
proved evident as Ventura spun on the spot 180°,
and then manoeuvred astern at a speed of 4 knots
through the channel to apposition Starboard side to
quay. With clearance granted and gangways at the
ready, all were free to proceed ashore.

From departure Ocho Rios to arrival Montego Bay,
Ventura steamed a distance of 86 Nautical miles,
Montego Bay, the capital of Saint James Parish on
Jamaica's north coast, is a major cruise ship port
with numerous beach resorts and golf courses
outside its commercial core. Popular beaches
include Doctor's Cave Beach and Walter Fletcher
Beach, home to an amusement park. There is also
snorkelling and diving at coral reefs in the protected
waters of Montego Bay Marine Park

Weather: Sparse Cloud Wind: Easterly, Force 4 (16 knots) Temperature: 30°C/86°F

All Souls on board and clearance granted was the indication to secure the gangways and let go lines. Thrusted off the berth, into the middle of the harbour, Ventruar progressed ahead through the channel and into open sea. The route to follow lay westward off to the north as American ports beckoned. Engines were set at a constant RPM for the voyage to the next port of call New Orleans.

#### Wednesday 21 February - At Sea

The passage show little changes in course as, Ventura continued sailing through the Caribbean Sea some 45 MM to the south of the Cuban coast. By evening, Ventura made her way into the 105 MM wide Yucatan Channel. The western tip of Cuba lay to the east or off the Starboard beam and Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula to the west, as Ventura altered course north westerly on route to New Orleans.

Noon Position: 20° 32.9′ N 082° 58.6′ W Distance till Noon: 404 NM Weather: Sparse Cloud Wind: Easterly up to Force 6 (24 knots) Temperature: 25°C/77°F

#### Thursday 22 February - At Sea

Out of the Yucatan and into the Gulf of Mexico, Ventura continued through the ninth largest body of water in the world. By midday, Ventura was on

the cusp of entering US waters, as several offshore platforms were visible on the horizon. Ventura propelled by the North Equatorial Current (now called the Gulf Stream) made good speed; so much so that by mid evening the plot station, alight by the sea buoy was achieved ahead of schedule. With pilot on board Ventura commenced her ten hour passage up the Mississippi one hour before midnight. The Mississippi River is the chief river of the second-largest drainage system on the North marican continent, second only to the Hudson Bay drainage system. The stream is entirely within the United States (although its drainage basin reaches into Canada), its source is in northern Minnesota and it flows generally south for 2,320 miles (3,730 km) to the Mississipi River Delta in the Gulf of Mexico.

Noon Position: 26° 32.1' N 088° 04.8' W Noon to Noon: 478 NM Weather: Sparse Cloud Wind: Easterly, Force 5 (20 knots) Temperature: 25°C/77°F

#### Friday 23 & 24 February - New Orleans

Friday 23 & 24 February - New Orleans
Thoughout the night, Ventura persisted against four knots of current as the Mississippi remained in flood (outward flowing). Speed reduced not only by the current but also by maine traffic, left Ventura at a steady ten of the expected fifteen knots to arrive at the Julia Street berth. With two new pilots on board for the second Leg, the initial arrival pilot disembarked, and Ventura continued aptly negotiating the Mississippi's hairpin meanders. With a third change of the piloting pair just after the half way mark, Ventura continued to the berth. With the river at flood, Ventura continued to the perth, with the river at flood, ventura commenced the swing bow to port at maximum thrust, with engines set to oppose (one ahead and one astern), as the master endeavoured to reduce the lateral motion as cause by the rivers flow. The rate of turn exceeded 30° as Ventura came about a full 180° and backed past the Paddle Steamers to be all fast port side to quay, from departure Montago Bay to arrival New Orleans, Ventura steamed a distance of 942 Nautical miles on sea passage and 105 Nautical miles of river transit.

Weather: Mostly Cloudy with Occasional Showers

Weather: Mostly Cloudy with Occasional Showers Wind: Easterly, Force 4 (14 knots) Temperature: 30°C/86°F

All Souls on board and clearance granted was the indication to secure the gangways and let go lines, however river traffic delayed departure. Thrusted-off the berth, into the middle of the river, Ventura progressed ahead and commenced the tedious river passage, which took only seven hours, as the flow remained constant at two and a half knots out ward thus aiding Ventura's speed. Ventura continued out of the Mississippi and into open sea, altering course southerly and setting RPM for a day at sea en-route to the next port of call Key West.

#### Sunday 25 February - At Sea

Ventura continued south easterly throughout the night as she progressed through the Gulf of Mexico. Saling past the last of the offshore installations by midday, Ventura's course remained unchanged throughout the day.

Noon Position: 26° 56.4° N 086° 47.8°W Distance till Noon: 288 NM Weather: Party Cloudy Wind: Southerly, Force 4 (14 knots) Temperature: 29°C/84.2°F

#### Monday 26 February - Key west

Throughout morning, Ventura altered to an easterly course as she approached Key West. With Pilot onboard, the SS Meter wide Key West harbour Channel was entered and precision navigation ensued. After 10 nM of persistent accuracy, Ventura entered the harbour and with the usual dextenty, was all fast Starboard side to quay from departure New Orleans to arrival Key West, Ventura steamed a distance of 505 Nautical miles.

Weather: Partly Cloudy Wind: South-easterly, Force 4 (15 knots) Temperature: 30°C/86°F

After all Guest and Crew were back onboard and all pre-departure on Bridge checks were completed, Ventra was ready for sail. Captain ordered to let go all line, when all lines were clear forward and aft, Captain started thrusting off the berth, in safe distance off the berth, engines were set astern. When Ventura reached her turning circle, Master made 180° swing to Starboard. After turn, Ventura used a reoppocal course to pass narrow channel into deep sea. After disembarking the local pilot Ventura set easterly heading into next port of call.

#### Tuesday 27 February - Port Everglades

Tuesday 27 February - Port Everglades
At early in the morning Ventura rounded southerly
tip of Florida, and set Northerly courses. With Gulf
Stream current, which gave us 3 knots of push,
Ventura made her final "approach to pilot station,
Leaving Miami on our Port side and before pilot
embarked, wide turn to Port side was made. With
local pilot on board, Captain safely navigate vessel
into narrow buoyed channel before entering port
harbour. Inside harbour waters, Ventura made 90°
swing and proceed backwards reached her final
docking position, Starboard side to the quay.
From departure Key West to arrival Port Everglades
Ventura steamed a distance of 184 Nautical miles.

Weather: Mostly clear skies with scattered clouds Wind: North-easterly, Force 4 (13 knots) Temperature: 25°C/77°F

Ventura was ready to sail, with all Guest and Crew on board and clearance granted from local authorities. Just before order from Bridge to let go all lines, an emergency situation occurred. One of fellow Guest had to be taken to the hospital. Fast and efficiency medical evacuation was carried out by local ambulance. When the medical evacuation was completed, all gangways were secured and shell doors closed. Ventura let go all lines and left harbour waters of Port Everglades. After clearing buoyed channel and local pilot was disembarked, engines were put to full ahead and northerly headings were set to our next destination Port Canaveral.

#### Wednesday 28 February - Port Canaveral

Wednesday 28 February - Port Canaveral On the course of the night and throughout the morning. Ventura finds herself into northerly heading along to Florida coast. With strong northerly set of Gulf Stream current, which we used as extra power on engines, Ventura made her final approach to the Port Canaveral Pilot Station. At early morning with pilot on board Ventura made her way through buoyed channel. Finally passed breakwater and after 180° tym into the inner harbour basin, Ventura made all line fast, Starboard side to guay. Air Bridges connected, gangways landed, and after clearance granted all Guest were free to go ashore and enjoy pleasant day in Post Canaveral, From departure Port Everglades to arrival Port Canaveral, Ventura steamed a distance of 150 Nautical miles

Weather: Same scattered clouds with many sunny

spells. Wind: South-easterly, Force 4 (15 knots) Temperature: 23°C/73°F

All souls were on board and clearance granted when the gangways were shipped and the manoeuvring commenced. Thrusting off the berth Ventura set her engines ahead then proceeded past the breakwaters and out of the harbour. With pilot away, Ventura continued northerly courses.

#### Thursday 1 & 2 March - Charleston

Thursday 1 & 2 March - Charleston

On the course of the night and throughout the morning, Ventura finds herself into northerly heading towards to our last port of call in to the USA. After leaving behind us Florida State, Ventura commenced sail along coast of South Carolina, still using the favourable set of Guiff Stream currents. With all pre-arrival checks completed and all Bridge Team members in place, Ventura made her approach to pilot boarding station to embark our local pilot. After struggling with strong river current, Ventura was safe alongside into Charleston Passenger Terminal. Starboard side alongside with all line made fast, Air Bridge connected as well ship's gangway landed, all Guest were free to go ashore and explore Charleston. From departure Port Canaveral to arrival Charleston, Ventura steamed a distance of 264 Nautical miles.

Weather: Mostly cloudy throughout with same little patches of blue skies. Occasionally patchy rain Wind: North-westerly, Force 4 (12 knots), increasing to Force 6 (25 knots) at the evening. Temperature: 17°C/B3°F

Temperature: 17°C/63°F

Next day after overnight stay in Charleston, Ventura was preparing for departure and passage through Atlantic Ocean, Unfortunately, due to bad weather forecast, which was caused by storm kiley, the planned route and itinerary had to be changed. Weather conditions forecast on Ventura's initial route, largely exceeded the conditions for a safe and comfortable trip. After considering all safety aspects, decisions was made that Ventura will use a new route, which lead her south form the most daggerous weather condition. This new route would be longer but more safe and comfortable for guests and Crew. With all souls onboard and after vessel was ready for sea passage as well for heavy weather condition. Ventura with pilot onboard left Charleston harbour. After cleaning breakwater as well buoyed channel, pilot was disembarking and Captain rang "Full Away on Sea Passage". Engines were put on full ahead and Ventura commenced her voyage on way back home, towards Southampton.

#### Saturday 3 March - At Sea

During course of the night and throughout the day, Wentura finds herself into initial course 110° increasing the distance behind to the coast of North America. Ventura was saling south to avoid the area with bad weather condition, affected by storm Riley. Ventura experienced more than 8 meters swell, travelling across Atlantic Ocean form storm Riley.

Noon Position: 30° 22.9' N 072° 23.4' W Distance till Noon: 414 NM Weather: Overcast with not precipitation. Wind: North-westerly, Force 9 (45 knots) Temperature: 22°C/72°F

#### Sunday 4 March - At Sea

hroughout the night, Ventura set on South-easterly headings, approximate at 8.00am in the morning Ventura change to easterly heading of 090°. Our Noon position placed us same 250 Nautical miles to the South of Bermudan Island. At the evening, at about 6.00pm Ventura altered course into Eastnorth-easterly of 070°, towards to Azores Island, across the Atlantic Ocean.

Noon Position: 28° 29.0' N 064° 31.7' W Noon to Noon: 431 NM Weather: Mostly cloudy with same brightening, no resolutions precipitation
Wind: North-westerly, Force 6 (25 knots)
Temperature: 22°C/72°F

#### Monday 5 March - At Sea

Over course of the night and throughout the day Ventura kept the East -north-easterly heading of 070° towards Azores Island on her transatiantic crossing. During the day the nearest land or in Latin Terra Firma was around 550 Nautical miles North-west of us on our Port quarter, which was Bermudan Island.

Noon Position: 30° 22.2° N 056° 00.4° W Noon to Noon: 463 NM Weather: Mostly cloudy with same sunny spell, no precipitation Wind: Westerly, Force 6 (25 knots) Temperature: 21°C/70°F

#### Tuesday 6 March - At Sea

Tuesday 6 March - At Sea
Beautiful clear, blue skies greeted us on another
Ventura sea day. Ventura throughout the night and
day followed East-north-easterly heading of 070°
towards Azores Island across the Atlantic Ocean. Our
Noon position gives us the same latitude as Tinpoli
in Libya or San Diego, California in the USA. The
average depth beneath the keel was 5000 metres,
which equates to approximately 16404 feet. During
the day the nearest land was around 855 Nautical
miles North-east of us on our Port shoulder, which
was flores island, the most westward island of the
Archipelago of the Azores.

Noon Position: 32° 41.9' N 047° 41.5' W Noon to Noon: 449 NM Weather: Pleasant, sunny day with little amount of Vocation reasons, sumy day with inter-clouds. Wind: South-westerly, Force7 (28 knots) Temperature: 22°C/72°F

#### Wednesday 7 March - At Sea

Throughout last night and during the day we have continued to follow our East—north-easterly course across the Atlantic Ocean. During the day Ventura, find herself crossing over the Middle Atlantic Ridge (MAR).

Noon Position: 34° 57.6' N 039° 22.5' W Noon to Noon: 442 NM Weather: Overcast in the morning, cleared into the afternoon. Wind: South-westerly, Force 8 (38 knots) Temperature: 21°C/70°F

# Thursday 8 March - At Sea

Thursday 8 March - At Sea East-north-easterly courses along laid down track Ventura continued over night and majority of the day. With the progress of the day, Ventura made her approached to the Archipelago of the Azores. At around 9.00pm Ventura passed between Sao Miguel Island (on which it is located Ponta Delgada) on our Starboard side in distance of 50 Nautical miles and Terceira Island (on which it is located Praia da Victoria) on our Port side in distance of 27 nautical miles. In this point Ventura altered course to Northeasterly of 047° and commit to a great circle track across the Atlantic to make way towards the English Channel.

Noon Position: 37° 21.1' N 030° 22.5' W Noon to Noon: 453 NM Weather: Partly cloudy with a lot of sunny spells in the morning. Overcast with same occasionally haze in the atternoon. Wind: South-westerly, Force 8 (35 knots)

Temperature: 18°C/64°F

#### Fridau 9 March - At Sea

Ventura continued to sail the arc along the great circle track towards the English Channel. By midday Ventura was some 600 Nautical miles due Northwest of the Lisbon in Portugal, and the nearest land or in Latin Terra Firma was around 560 Nautical miles east of us, which was Cape Finisterre, the Northwest thing (Spain).

Noon Position: 41° 28.2° N 022° 01.5° W Noon to Noon: 476 NM Weather: Overcast with occasionally rain, Sea spray on deck Wind: North-westerly, Force 11 (60 knots) Temperature: 15°C/59°F

#### Saturday 10 March - At Sea

Early-morning saw Ventura sail across the Azores Biscay Ridge as she continued along the arc of the great circle track towards the English Channel. By midday Ventura was 350 Nautical miles off the French coast of Brest on swift approach of the English Channel.

Noon Position: 46° 26.3' N 012° 46.7' W Noon to Noon: 460 NM Weather: Overcast with occasional squalls and showers Wind: South-south-westerly, Force 8 (38 knots) Temperature: 12°C/54°F

#### Sunday 11 March - Southampton

Early morning Ventura finds herself at the entrance to the English Channel. With Lands End only 25 Nautical miles off the Port beam Ventura altered into the English Channel, and maintained throughout easterly courses to remain only 15 Nautical miles off the coast of England.

Noon Position: 50° 02.6′ N 003° 22.2′ W Noon to Noon: 448 NM Weather: Mostly cloudy with same drizzle Wind: South-south-east, Force 8 (36 knots) Temperature: 11°C/52°F

Ventura entered the Solent in the evening. The Nab Tower was only 10 Nautical miles away when Ventura slowed, boarded the pilot then proceeded to the west of the Nab. The speed was increased, to pass Cowes on the Isle of Wight, as Ventura prepared to negotiate the hairpin bends of Bramble Bank and Cafshot Spit. With a slight heel to starboard and then to port Ventura accomplished the turns then slowed to pass Fawley Oil Terminal and Dock Head. As per the norm for every arrival and departure, the team was briefed, and Officers went to their stations forward and Aft, and reported clearances. The Master delicately pirouetted Ventura into position at Ocean Terminal, Southampton, home. From departure Charleston to arrival Southampton, Ventura steamed a distance of 4142 Nautical miles.







It was especially great as the weather was amazing for the whole time. We used the ferry from South Wales – Fishguard to Rosslare co Wexford. We stayed on a Apple tree farm in the heart of co Tipperary which was 1st fab cider smells everywhere (did you know Bulmers is from Cahir?) and we experienced our 1st ever campsite eviction at Bennettsbridge. #### Notes (hopefully useful to other motorhomers)

- Last week and a half of our hols was school hols in Eire, from the weds they get 3 months off in Eire but less half terms.
- 2. Many towns have heights barriers on car parks and charge parking fees , not exactly motorhome friendly
- 3. Many campsites charge extra for electrics and showers (ranging from 50c to Euro \$1.50)
- 4. N roads (equivalent to our A roads) & M roads great, R roads (our B) variable and very bumpy esp in Donegal, L roads (our C) very very variable... avoid if poss ;)
- 5. Most signage doesn't say "how far" but brown tourist signs great and WAW history and signs wonderful
- 6. Get both green books for campsites and always carry small change (i.e euros) for showers

DAY4: Tues 19/6 Cahir co Tipperary – Rathkeale co Limmerick 50 miles 1hrs 30 mins... visited Swiss Cottage at Cahir fab visit and Cahir is a great heritage town, really liked it. Tipperary & Limmerick town en route. Adare is rated as the best visit in Ireland and have to say it was fab if a little busy! Stayed at Adare Camping And Caravan Park, Drehedtarsna Adare Limerick LK (Rathkeale area)

DAY5: Wed 20/6 Adare campsite, Rathkeale co Tipperary -Tarbert Island co Kerry - Kilkee Co Clare 32 miles 50 mins... goes along Shannon river edge, caught Shannon Ferry to Killimer, Killrush... i.e Kerry to Clare approx \$25 takes 20 mins then stayed at Strand Camping Killard Road, Doonbeg Doonbeg CE one of our fave campsites ever, very small owned by English couple, great showers pitches, facilities. Saw Ballycrinan shingle beach, Moyne, Carrigaholt (lunch by the waves), Kilkee (Victorian seaside town), Spanish Point (and the man who could gab for Ireland;)), went go to Loophead lighthouse R487, then returned up west coast of clare etc etc Gained extra day from original plan by missing out Green Acres campsite (yuck!) White strands beach nearby is deserted and possible one of the best blue flag beaches in Eire!

DAY6: Thurs 21/6 Doonbeg Co Clare -Lahinch Beach-Doolin Total: 30 miles 50 mins... 1st bit of journey to Lahinch beach is 20miles 38 mins then coastal route R478 thru Luogh-Roadford-Doolin / Doolin Pier Met Mr & Mrs Welwyn Garden City and Pete & Jane from Cambridge whom we also remet at Clifden beach Eco site later, basically cos annies leg was playing up we abandoned walk into famous Paddy O'Connors bar in Doolin from Doolin Pier Stayed at Nagles Doolin Camping, NAGLES DOOLIN CAMPING GPS 53.0176827, -9.3945482. Visited Cliffs of Moher site on route, wonderful but hugely touristy

DAY7: Fri 22/6 2nd day at Doolin Pier campsite (very noisy in eve as weekend and we pitched next to kids playpark, note to self DON'T DO IT AGAIN;) )but Boat cruise Bill O'Briens boats to Aran Island, Inis Mor (biggest but called in at Meain & Oirr isles as well) \$30 pp Fab day out in the sun and did tourist bus around island... glad we got out of mr wee's first bus;) Great jumpers tops bought Stay at Nagles ...

DAY8: Sat 23/6 Doolin - Galway Total: 48 miles 1hr 50 mins... 1st bit of journey to Burren was via Murrogh and Ballyvaughan... Stayed at Galway City Caravan & Camping Park, Ballyloughane Rd, Renmore, Ireland...visit lough (lake) atilia and river corrib Not the best campsite in fact the worst E\$34 and most expensive, lunch at site by Galway bay in sun, fab then caught the 402 bus into Eyre square from opposite campsite and had a great time in Galway city, esp music pubs food etc in Shop street Our fave Eire City.... Had dinner with my Galway girl in a flash restaurant Swiss campers we met at Doolin also here and went in and back on our same bus, although verbal comms tricky we did a lot of hand shaking and back slapping;)

DAY9: Sun 24/6 Galway-Cleggan beach Galway - Clifden Total: 59 miles 2hr 7 mins... via various lakes and the 12 pins mountains, Stayed at Clifden Eco Camping & Caravan park, Claddaghduff Road, Wild Atlantic Way, Clifden, Co. Galway, H71W024... Loved all of Connemara, River Owenglin. Chris at Eco site had it for 8 years, knew couple at Doonbeg Strand Camping. He kindly gave us slot 1 overlooking the beach, Keef swam in the Atlantic, v cold. Outside cooking on tappenyaki (fun) plus caught up with Pete & Jane from Doolin again

DAY10: Mon 25/6 went to see Omey island (didn't drive across as tidal sand bar but you can park up at the start and walk) and then saw Cleggan ferry to Inishbofin Island (30 mins) £17.50 return pp 11.30 return 1... missed out as didn't have time – it is the island of the white cow. Connamara National Park, v busy, not much space for motorhomes Lonch by lough in Connamara mountains (such fab views). Letterfrack, Louisburgh, Renvyle (busy but lovely harbour) plus Cleggan to Westport Co. Mayo Total: 43 miles 1hr 27 mins Where we filled up on fuel. Then Westport – Keel West R319 over Achill island (via bridges) Saw Killary fjord and one of the circular coastal routes on Achill, aasleagh falls, Mallaranny, Keel bay Croaghaun Total: 38 miles 1hr 13 mins then stayed at Keel Sandybank caravan and camping park, Achill island, co Mayo

DAY11: Tues 26/6 Keel West – Ballina, co Mayo. Went to see the fabulous Keem Bay, wild scenery, amazingly steep road but so so worth it. Also did the 2nd coastal loop road on Achill which was wonderful. Don Allum the 1st man to row the Atlantic both ways landed in Achill island. Johnny Kilbane boxer. Doohoma, Ciede Total: 65 miles 1hr 56 mins then stay at Belleek Caravan and camping park, Faranoo, Ballina Co Mayo. Great map of the Wild Atlantic Way here

DAY12: Weds 27/6 Official start of 3 months school hols.... Much more busy at sites from now on Ballina – Sligo, Co Sligo. Total: 37 miles 57 mins Continued on on the Wild Atlantic Way, saw Ballina Quay. Pronounced Bal-ina not like the ozzie Baleena;) Many Kiwi and Oz names came from Eire, the Famine exodus presumably. Visted amongst others Innishcrone, Split rock, Aughris head, (great pub and bunnies), Killglass, Easkey R297... Lovely Mr Wippy in Strandhill town shop plus fresh fish from stall from man from Devon... nice on griddle with salad .... Yummy All near Sligo City, Stayed at Strandhill camping and caravan site. Strandhill rd Sligo, beautiful views of the sea but a very dangerous cliff edge and rips so sign said no swimming or paddling... did anyone take any notice? rules seem to be made to break in Eire possibly along with driving road rules.... Debate???

DAY13: Thurs 28/6 Strandhill - Sligo, Co Sligo- Ballyshannon, co Donegal .... Bally means on a river in Gallic, taught in schools compulsory from juniors (xclent) Ulster Nr NI (UK) Ulster then back to Ballyshannon campsite, co Donegal Then to Ross Point (home of W B Yeats – William Butler, Bro John Butler (rich Irish family name) a painter (see his pic under Keel Bay pix)), Deadmans point, Drumcliffe Friary, Yeats graveside & St Columba, Spanish Armada view, Classiebawn castle at Mullaghmore (where lord louis mountbatten was killed) Total: 40 miles 1 hr 4 mins Road goes along the coast. Stayed at Lakeside caravan and camping, Beleek rd, ballyshannon, Co Donegal. Manged by Mungo who had a huge US pop outs van and offered to buy ours off us – No way Jose! Note very busy at weekends OK otherwise, nice Liverpool/Welsh couple next to us and our pal from Austria with doggie. It is an ACSI site No 1253 and as we had gained 2 days from original plan got 2 days at E\$19 Acsi price.

DAY14: Fri 29/6 2nd day at Lakeside campsite Ballyshannon – supposedly Irelands oldest town (but we saw a few of those) but definitely the birth place of Rory Gallagher. Nice cooked brekkie on griddle outdoors in the sun, plus Irish white pudding – yummy. Supposedly live Irish music on site & restaurant – just Sat for music but I did watch a rather boring Belgium vs England 2nd 11 world cup match with no atmosphere but 1 pint of Orchard thieves. We are Sunday dinner when we came back there later for a second stay and very good it was too

DAY15: Sat 30/6 Ballyshannon, co Donegal along the WAW in co Donegal to Dungloe co Donegal, Rossnowlagh and beach, Donegal town itself, Castle and music festival in town square, not a great city / town, the fab Lough Eske at Arnold point, Fish town Killibeg allegedly Irelands major fishing port and like Grimsby you could smell it coming, but harbour very nice. Shopped here in Supa Value. Muckross Head, lunch at Creenveen, Slieve league cliffs, Glencomcille (folk museum not great tho' too new)Stayed at family park in the green book at Dungloe after yet another Mr Whippy 99 Nice family who ran it. very friendly and chatty

DAY16: Sun 1/7 Dungloe - Ballyshannon, co Donegal our only bad day weather wise... low cloud sea mist and very very windy. We went via Kingcasslach, Cnoc Fola (the red sea), Gweedore, Magheraroarty & beach, Queen of aran fishing ferry (passengers only) to the Tory isles, Doe Castle view for lunch, an Irish Romeo & Juliet, Island Roy view (just) and the bridge across, Fanad head and lighthouse. Realising the weather was bad and we still had a 100 mile round trip on very minor roads to Malin Head (star wars fame) and end of WAW we turned back thru Ramelton (Lifford) on the river Lennon, Letterkenny (big town) N13, N15, Ramelton had lovely flowers, old castle, and fishing (pity it was drizzling), back thru Donegal & castle, Ballyshannon town and Rory Gallagher (its famous son) then to campsite again for nice Sunday dinner. I had Irish beef, Annie had turkey and gammon... Yummy

DAY17: Mon 2/7 Ballyshannon co Donegal, Ulster via Cartronbog & Drumshanbo to Battlebridge, co Leitrim on the edge of Lough Allen (this road slipped over the border briefly into NI unbeknown to us at Beleek co Fermanagh and we stopped to see Lough Melvin on the road to Garrison before going back into Eire. Back in Eire we saw the lovely Parkes castle on Lough Gill co Sligo (again - want to read about the spanish armada captain cuellar) and W B Yeats trail and had lunch on Gill Total: 42 miles 1 hr 16 mins Road goes along the edge of the lake. Tried staying at the Allen centre, Curraghill, Drumshanbo, co Leitrim but it is now a Luxury leisure park on the lake with chalets to buy, the campsite has long since gone so we found a new one in the green book at Battlebridge called Beirnes (not bad facilities, not great position tho)

DAY18: Tues 3/7 Battlebridge co Leitrim - Athlone, co Roscommon via Strokestown House(owned by the Mahons), Gardens and Irish National Famine Museum & Roscommon on the edge of Lough Ree. Had lunch of quiche and salad in the café plus the best lemon meringue pie we have ever had (apart from Annies he says quickly) Total: 53 miles 1 hr 46 mins Stayed at Athelone, Ballykeeran ACSI site No 1252 \$19 in season. Visited Dog & Duck pub to watch football ENG vs Columbia with lovely Irish people. They shook my hand as I left and wished the team well;) wonderful

DAY19: Wed 4/7 Athlone, co Roscommon-thru co Offaly - Portlaoise, co Laois (known as Queen's county) to Bennettsbridge co Kilkenny via quick look at lough Ree, Athelone town, Tullamore, Killbeggan Distillery, Lilliput (don't bother – its not Jonathan Swifts ancestral home, that's Dublin)Total: 50 miles 1 hr 18 mins Tried Staying at Laois (pronounced Leash) camping and caravan, r445 portlaoise, clondouglas,mountrath rd 53°0'29"N 7°22'19"W Portlaosie co Laois, even tho we called in at a tourist office in Heritage town Abbeyleix (lady very helpful) where thye thought it was open then decided it wasn't, we spent a long time trying to find driving almost as far as Montreath – Our satnav (or me) cocked up and took us towards Kilkenny city rather than the Wicklow mountains which is disappointing but as it would be a 200 mile round trip we decided to can it and do it on our next visit to Eire. So we stayed at Nore Valley Park, Bennettsbridge, a kid friendly site in the Green book, bad choice! This was the scene of our first ever campsite eviction... the battle of the Pitchforks... appalling campers

DAY20: Thurs 5/7 Bennettbridge, woke up decided as we would probably do 3 days of kids screaming at Enniscworthy site we would reorg our Ferry and come back today, giving us a little more time to prepare for grand daughter minding – Visted Nicholas Mosse pottery in Bennettsbridge which was fab, Annie got a nice blue jug (handpainted) We watched them working and there was some great history around the grain mill and waterwheel. We then stopped for lunch at Johnstown Castle Gardens outside Rosslare for lunch and a lovely stroll around the gardens and lake, very tranquil, peacocks and our last 99 Flake of the hols (at E\$2 I can highly recommend) Alas the castle was under redevelopment so sadly closed. Then it was ferry from Rosslare 6.20pm, arrived Fishguard Sth Wales 9.40 pm... then 6.5 hours of fairly gruelling driving back thru South and North wales coming out at Welshpool - Shrewsbury borders before any "fast" roads

DAY21: Fri 6/7 Arrived back home as the sun was rising about 4.30 am after comfort break, coffee and pasty M54, 3 hours sleep but caught up the next day..... all in all a fab hol in the Wendy house and the best summer since 1976, can't be bad

Its in the Ireland Green book campsites. There are 2 of these, suggest you pick them up from any tourist office and often the campsites themselves have them

Another campsite we would recommend in Ireland because of its private beach and Eco set up by owner Chris is the **Clifden Eco beach site**, it only gets 4 stars however as if busy (and it was when we were there) there really are not enough showers... only 2 unisex for whole site can be tricky

This time we were on pitch 9, last time  $\underline{\mathsf{Blog}\ 60}$  retrospective we were on pitch 7.


We can thoroughly recommend the site, it is peaceful and extremely well serviced with new facilities and at least 3 motorhome service points.

# Blog 135 - Faroes & Iceland

NOTTS (home)->Faroes & Iceland via Holland, Germany & Denmark ->NOTTS (home) **5257 mile**s

What a fantastic 2 months away, scenery to die for, lovely people, couldn't have asked for better weather in Iceland, as an example the preceding June it rained non stop for 28 days. We had 16 consecutive days of 24 hour sun. You get used to the sun falling and then re-arising moments later. It just never got dark in either the Faroes nor Iceland so it was really weird when returning to Germany via Denmark when it did go dark.

Besides 6 countries, 5257 miles by road (wendy house was amazing up some of the mountain sides), snow, sun, fog, polar winds, more sun we also spent 7 days at sea so it was like throwing in a mini cruise as well on both Stena lines Harwich-Hoek Van Holland return and Smyril lines MS Norrona from Hirtshals top of Jutland, Denmark to initially Torshavn in the Faroes then Seydisfjordur, East Iceland return. Smyril line is a Faroese owned passenger and cargo ferry / transportation company.

The ferry goes right past the Shetlands, indeed when we were younger it did stop there but as not enough traffic now Smyril stopped it. Bad news for Brits as you now have to go all the way thru Europe to get there!

It is worth saying that the Faroes has 18 islands connected either via Ferry, Bridge or undersea Tunnel. Some we weren't able to do especially Sandoy... ferry over subscribed and the far north islands as the tunnel at 3.1m was a little too low for comfort when taking the van thru. The Smyril line provide you with a booklet for download of the Faroes campsites. A selection of our fave places where Gasadalur on Vagar, Torshavn campsite views of Hestur, Kaldbak on Streymoy, Vestmanna, Gjogv on Eysturoy, Hosvik, Saksun (both Streymoy), Vikings at Leirvik, Trollanes on Kalsoy. See the pictures to get a feel. We loved it, a week and a half is probably enough but you are guided by the ferry timetable! Also glad we went there 1st before Iceland. I think on balance it's the right order.

Iceland is a magnificent place to visit. Absolutely bowled over by it. Apart from my scary 2nd day morning climbing over the mountain out of Seydisfjordur in driving snow and winds where you could barely see the road, much less that it was surrounded on both sides by frozen lakes... it was all a joy! Get an Iceland camping card if you are staying more than 2 weeks, sites are plentiful in the east, south west, western fjords and the north... not so in big stretches of the southern coast. Sites are not great but mostly adequate with the exception of Reydarfjordur, Isafjordur and Siglufjordur which are wonderful. If you are not using the card it can be very costly. Reyjkavik for example is not part of this scheme and about £39 / night. Take as much canned food, rice, pasta etc with you that you can fit in your van to control your expenditure. Sadly whale watching for us at Husavik was off, foggy and blowing a hoolie! A selection of our fave places were Reydarfjordur (east) and areas out to Nordfjord, whole of the western Fjords, Vatnajokull NP, Jokulsarlon Lagoon Icebergs, Porshavn (north), many of the lovely fjords and Waterfalls, the Kerfla active volcano area (north west), Siglufjordur (north), Husavik (north), Grindavik (south west) and as a city Akureyri. See the pictures to get a feel.



Nearby is Sherwood Pines and the Sherwood Forest steam railway and associated playpark both of which we visited



We went out each day, the weather being slightly better on the Tuesday and much better, indeed some sunshine on the Wednesday and typically full sunshine on the way home on Thursday.







Living life in coronavirus times, which could be a while yet

Prime Minister Boris Johnson started lockdown on the evening of 23rd of March 2020 On the 5th April he was admitted to hospital after 10 days self isolating with the Corona Virus On the 6th April he is in intensive care with deteriorating symptoms The Queen addressed the nation at 8pm on 5th April

Excel now known as NHS Nightingale and will be a hospital for up to 4,000 patients, most of whom are on ventilators. Similar venues being used in cities across the country. Opened by Prince Charles at 11am on 3rd April Community support groups established, to support the vulnerable, elderly, immunocompromised and people in enforced isolation due to exposure, in their community

Petrol price close to home was less than £1... the first time since 2007, but when there is no where to go hardly surprising

Schools closed on Friday 20 March.Remote learning in place either via Home schooling or BBC Bitesize Self-distancing measures required Don't stand so close to me. i.e 2m

Tape on the floors at grocery stores and others to help distance shoppers (2 mtrs) from each other.

Limited number of people inside stores, therefore, line-ups outside the store doors

Non-essential stores, pubs and businesses mandated closed People who can work from home should do, Boris decreed back to work 14 May 2020 for construction workers and folk who can't work from home

Parks , trails, entire cities closed or restricted to locals only in their bubble.

Entire sports seasons cancelled

Olympics postponed to 2021 Concerts, tours, festivals etc cancelled

Weddings family celebrations holiday gatherings even funerals cancelled, although relaxed to allow upto 9 attendees mid may

No masses, churches are closed No gatherings of 50 or more, then 20 or more, then 10 or more. Now, Don't socialize with anyone outside of your home bubble , but rather confusingly from 14 May you can see 1 person from outside your household in an open space BUT if your parents are your cleaner or buying your house you can see both of them confuseddotcom!

Netflix, Amazon Prime, Disney+, and all other TV networks are on in every home daily now Children's outdoor play parks are closed Reruns of the Chelsea flower show. Have I got news for you and just about anything else done via Zoom or Skype. Everyones bookcase as a background is the new Claim to fame, especially if you strategically place Stephen Hawkings a brief history of Time. We are to distance from each other. Shortage of masks gowns gloves for our front-line workers.Both NHS and Care Homes. Care homes sadly an afterthought. At least a 3rd are dieing there. Very worrying. Government main priority to "Protect the NHS" NOT surprisingly to "Save Lives" PPE (new vocabulary along with social distancing) meaning Personal Protective Equipment

Shortage of ventilators for the critically ill in many parts of the world

Refrigerated trucks for the dead outside hospitals in the USA Italy Spain China and more. Sadly mid May UK becomes 2nd highest number of deaths in the world behind the US and highest in Europe 35k by 18 May although ONS figures show 3k higher (never explained rationally)

Panic buying sets in and we have limits on toilet paper disinfecting supplies, paper towels, staple foods (Eggs & milk become issues, definite supply chain issues as farmers say they are throwing away litres of milk) hand sanitizer Flour is hard to get because the packaging comes from China and borders are closed, interestingly not in the UK until 18 May appropriate the packaging comes from China and borders are closed.

Manufacturers distilleries and other businesses switch their lines to help make visors, masks hand sanitizer and PPE Multiple hand washes per day becomes the "New Normal", even allowing post to sit on the door mat for 3 days, the time for Covid19/Coronavirus to go from packaging

Fines are established for breaking lockdown rules Initially £30 then increased to £100 although some debate about whether or not the police can enforce them

Stadiums and recreation facilities overseas open up for the overflow of Covid-19 patients.

Public Park areas turned into carayan parks for stranded tourists to self isolate

Also true of Boris's 5% off for NHS & Care workers buying new homes in what he hopes will "kick start" the economy

A 99 year old WWII veteran Captain Tom Moore raised £33 million for NHS charities walking 100 lengths of his garden before he turned 100. His target was £1000. People from all over the world donated to his cause. 319K deaths globally so far.(19 May 2020)

This is the Novel Coronavirus (Covid-19) Pandemic, WHO declared March 11th, 2020.

Why, you ask, do I write this status? One day it will show up in my memory feed, and it will be a yearly reminder that life is precious and not to take the things we dearly love for granted We have so much! Be thankful. 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
